Overview of issue

Robert Hale/ Mark Pratt- Division of PTE wants to make Quality Program Standards grants available to all program areas. They are receiving political pressure from legislators to make the change.

Report of committee meeting by Shawn Dygert-

Committee members included PTE teachers Shannon Holt and Shawn Dygert along with others. Changes or additions to Ag IQPS standards include:

- eliminating curriculum section
- eliminating facility evaluation
- requiring ACTE membership
- eliminating administrator checklist
- basing student leadership section solely on percent membership and percent attending events
- major emphasis on TSA scores
- no application required- just a ranking
- switching award to program instead of individual teachers

Discussion

- Amount of grant needs to stay at \$10,000
- Current legislation is very specific, can't include all program areas at this point
- Mark Pratt- would not welcome the job of going back to supporters to tell them that we're going backward
- October 14- 4 instructors and admin from each program area are meeting with the Division to discuss how to move forward
 - o Names submitted by Sam Condie- Shawn Dygert, Marc Beitia, Kyle Stapleton, Steve Wilder, Gaylen Smyer (admin), and Mark Pratt (bus & industry)
- Need to develop an official IVATA position
- Some dissent in AgEd, but most will get on board

- Mark Pratt- what is our desired outcome? To increase quality and create environment to encourage teachers to be better.
- Mark Pratt- what could cause this to fail? Going backward- rewarding mediocrity
- Steve Wilder- Dwight Johnson is meeting with Alan Heikkila and Steve Wilder Wednesday afternoonwhat is the opinion from around the state? Most- stay the course, it's not an entitlement- not everyone should be getting the grant, concerns with application but can be ironed out with more work
- TSA discussion
 - o Virginia CTECs
 - oWorkplace Readiness will be administered- tests soft skills- not technical at all
 - Steve Rayborn is advocating for changes in TSAs
 - Have to give a TSA for Carl Perkins but Idaho isn't meeting that requirement like other statesthere are other ways to meet requirement
 - O New changes are a smoke screen- not a real measure of success
- Tammy Ackerland is our #1 fan and helping keep Glenn informed of changes and advocating for Division leaders to meet with ag teachers
- Discussion on more roundtables
 - Article recently cited 60,000 ag jobs available for our students with only 35,000 ag grads to fill the need
 - o Ag is alive and well
 - o Need to launch a fall PR campaign to promote positives of Ag Ed Initiative
 - Capital Press article
 - News release template for local papers
 - 43% increase in added cost in one year
- Need to focus on the whole picture of Ag Ed Initiative- not just IQPS
 - o Created Casey Zufelt's position- Idaho FFA Executive Secretary
 - o Additional added cost funding- 43% in one year
 - o Incentive grant process
 - New program start up funds

Next steps

- Sam Condie and Robert Hale will draft IVATA position and share with IVATA officers and district directors
- o Jaysa Fillmore will send out email on the ListServ asking for positive stories and examples on how the Idaho Ag Education Initiative has helped programs
- o Shawn Dygert and Jaysa Fillmore will work together to create a news release template for local programs to fill in and share with local papers to promote positive PR
- o Information from Roundtables in June will be compiled and disseminated to help with PR
